COURSE DESCRIPTION

It is fair to say that few branches of the law have, in recent times, developed as swiftly and explosively across jurisdictions as the law of intellectual property (IP). In Singapore, this is evidenced by the Government's push for a sound and comprehensive legal framework for the promotion and protection of IP, and by the setting up of the Intellectual Property Office of Singapore (IPOS) and the IP Academy. More recently, several amendments were made to Singapore's IP legislation in order to implement the country's obligations under the United States – Singapore Free Trade Agreement.

You will, in this course, be introduced to the different types of IP rights and the various branches of IP law, in particular the law of copyright, patents and trademarks. Apart from learning the fundamental principles of IP law and the impact of international IP conventions and treaties, we will have the opportunity to explore, from a comparative perspective, the various policy issues which underpin much of the IP debate – in particular, controversies surrounding the protection, exploitation and enforcement of IP rights. Through group project work and presentations, we shall also examine how the IP regime operates in appropriate Asian jurisdictions and assess whether the protection and enforcement mechanisms in these jurisdictions measure up to international norms and standards.

The study of IP was, until quite recently, a somewhat esoteric specialisation. Today, IP occupies a central position in the global, knowledge-based economy and this course should therefore appeal to those who wish to equip themselves with knowledge of a burgeoning and highly relevant area of the law.

Each session of this course will be conducted as a seminar with 3 hours of instruction time and an additional 15-minute break.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS AND EXPECTATIONS

Class Participation

Each student will be assessed on his or her participation in class. All students should therefore complete the assigned reading prior to attending the seminar. Active participation by students will create a vibrant and interactive environment that is conducive for learning.

Group Presentations

Students will form their <u>own</u> teams of 2 to 3 persons (depending on class size) for group presentations.

A typical project will take the form of a *research (essay-type) question*, usually involving one or two topics/issues in IP law which have <u>not</u> been covered in any detail in class. The purpose of the group project is to expose students to legal research and writing. In this regard, **independent research is** *mandated* and students are reminded *not* to enlist research assistance from any other third party (SMU-affiliated or otherwise).

Presentations of the group project are required to be made orally and in writing and both forms of presentation will be graded in the following proportion: 20% for the written component (combined grade) and 10% for the individual oral component.

There is no word limit for the written answer but this must be submitted to the instructor *prior to* the start of the oral presentation in class.

[<u>N.B.</u>: Please be reminded that <u>plagiarism is strictly forbidden</u> and may result in a "fail" grade for the entire group. All materials and ideas gleaned from other sources must therefore be attributed accordingly.]

Final Examination

The final examination is typically a **3-hour open book** paper comprising hypothetical and/or essay questions. Although the examination is open-book, extensive reference to materials may prove detrimental to your final grade.
