SHAPING THE Future of law

In this rapidly changing world, lawyers encounter complex problems that cut across multiple disciplines and borders. Beyond traditional litigation practice, lawyers offer a range of other services, from advising on complex cross-border transactions and mediating family disputes to structuring state power and wealth management planning. Therefore, it is important to understand the law against the broader business, social, economic, institutional and political contexts.

Against this backdrop, our law curriculum is carefully designed to provide a firm theoretical foundation while being multi- and interdisciplinary, flexible and practice-oriented.

Our curriculum is constantly updated with input from the legal industry. The law modules are supplemented by the SMU Core Curriculum and relevant modules from the other schools. Beyond the basic curriculum, students can pursue our new LLB tracks or take a second degree or major from another school.

In small classes of up to 45, students gain confidence through vibrant seminar-style discussions, group presentations and written research assignments. Beyond traditional classroom activities, you will learn through hands-on work and closely supervised practical assignments in skills-based courses. Our signature SMU-X courses take experiential learning to the next level through supervised projects addressing real-world problems.

Further, you will see law in action through 10 weeks of law internship, 80 hours of community service, of which a minimum of 20 hours must be pro bono work. These are mandatory graduation requirements not only because of the obvious benefits of experiential learning but also because we want to instil the value of lawyering for good.

Through Law Study Mission courses, students gain a deeper understanding of other countries' legal systems, business environments, and cultures through organised tours to law firms, legal institutions, governmental agencies and businesses.



TEACHING EXPERTISE FROM AROUND THE WORLD

How did you prepare for your exchange?

As I would be living overseas for an extended period of time for the first time, I picked up life skills such as cooking and did research on logistical matters such as local transportation, amenities, and accommodation. I decided on staying at the student dormitory - UniSyd's Queen Mary Building, as this would give me a first-hand insight into UniSyd's rich student life and allow me to connect with other students studying there.

UniSyd?

I was curious to personally experience Australia's I chose Restitution and Unjust Enrichment and

My other two modules were International Human Rights Law and Introduction to Islamic Law which are modules unique to UniSyd. I was able to bring

a Singaporean perspective to the Australian table and apply what I learnt in my family law elective to write a comparative research paper on the respective Islamic family laws of Singapore and Australia.



I explored three different areas which featured different perspectives of Australia -Sydney (city life). Canberra (the administrative capital) and Tasmania (the exotic rural life). Next, I was able to connect with Aboriginal culture and understand the origins behind Australia's tradition of paying respects to the Traditional Owners of the land. Lastly, I experienced the beautiful landscape of Australia – its pristine beaches, farms and wildlife sanctuaries – and went on countless hikes in world-famous national parks such as the Blue Mountains.

Living independently taught me important life skills and challenged me beyond my comfort zone as an introvert. It was a unique experience interacting with students studying other courses as I was able to hear their first-hand insights, their passion and their challenges with respect to their major, and even travel around Sydney with these groups of people.





How have this and other SMU Global Exposure experiences benefited you?

In 2022, before my exchange programme, I was privileged to travel to Switzerland to participate in the John H Jackson Moot Competition (about World Trade Organisation law) and carry on SMU's strong mooting legacy. I had the chance to compete at the World Trade Organisation headquarters in Geneva and hone my legal instincts against the sharpest legal minds across the world.

Both experiences broadened my perspectives and helped me towards my goal of becoming an all-rounded cross-border lawyer, allowed me to connect with friends from around the world, and taught me valuable life lessons such as independent living and working, collaboration and supporting my team members.



PRO BONO

At the Yong Pung How School of Law, students perform legal community service pro bono publico (for the public good). Through our pro bono programme, students learn that the practice of law is a calling that brings with it opportunities to serve the community using their skills and knowledge. They appreciate the differences between theory and practice, and develop knowledge, skills, ethics, and professionalism to become lawyers better at serving both their clients and society more broadly.

INTERNSHIPS

Through internships, students learn about the practical workings of the legal system from a variety of perspectives. Students can intern at law firms and legal departments of corporations, banks, and so on, or with agencies such as ministries, the Attorney-General's Chambers, or the State Courts – or any combination of these.

Scan to view our Internship Partners I am privileged to serve as a Student Leader overseeing the smooth operation of the SMU Pro Bono Centre (SMU PBC)'s legal clinic. The role is filled with much learning and enrichment. Interacting closely with applicants for legal help, volunteer lawyers, SMU PBC staff, and fellow student volunteers has enabled me to gain a sound understanding of the key administrative work that is vital to the operation of the legal clinic.

There is no shortage of pro bono opportunities to suit any students' interests. I am fortunate to have explored many different pro bono placements and initiatives thus far. These include serving as a student volunteer at Pro Bono SG and the Community Justice Centre. I have also had the privilege of serving as a Legal Fellow at Justice Without Borders, an NGO focused on facilitating access to justice for regional migrant worker communities.

What are your memorable moments from the pro bono activities you've done so far?

I worked with a fellow student, under the supervision of SMU PBC's advisors, to provide a Legal Awareness Talk on the Mental Capacity Act, Lasting Powers of Attorney and Deputyship to doctors at KK Women's and Children's Hospital. We addressed practical realities that doctors face when they sometimes encounter legal challenges in assisting patients who may lack mental capacity.

I felt myself making a genuine difference in improving the lives of the wider community in my capacity as a law student. This had been one of the pro bono placements that signalled a turning point for me in my attitude towards advancing access to justice, and is an experience I am very grateful for.

Any advice to incoming freshmen looking to undertake pro bono activities?

Explore the myriad of opportunities during your time at YPHSL. Whether you are participating in pre-existing placements, or even initiating your own projects you are passionate about, the SMU PBC staff are very passionate and genuine about the pro bono cause, and are extremely supportive of students in their ambitions to advance access to justice. Explore with an open mind and compassionate heart, and enjoy the process!

Our students have unparalleled opportunities to participate in regional and international competitions, and have consistently produced world-class results. Under the Ian R Taylor International Moots Programme – which is also supported by leading firms WongPartnership and Providence Law Asia – around 100 students a year are able to participate in moot court (a simulation of court or arbitration proceedings) and alternative dispute resolution competitions. New students begin their exciting journey by participating in an orientation camp which is all about fun and making new friends. To help ease students in their transition to university life, all first-year students are assigned to members of the faculty, whom they may reach out to for academic advice. Since our first cohort of students graduated 12 years ago, many alumni have gone on to make their mark in the legal profession, industry and academia. Alumni from our pioneer cohorts have been appointed partners in esteemed law firms, while others have struck out on their own to establish their own private practices (such as BlackOak LLC and Breakpoint LLC) and legal tech start-ups (such as INTELLLEX and Regall).

We are proud to say that our young graduates have continuously punched well above their weight – they are highly sought after, well-placed, and competitively remunerated. Year after year, our graduates are significantly represented on the prestigious Justices' Law Clerk programme in the Supreme Court. A number of our graduates have gone on to pursue postgraduate studies in world-renowned institutions such as Harvard, Oxford and Cambridge.

Our graduates have consistently attained close to full employment soon after graduation, with some of the highest starting salaries. The 2022 Graduate Employment Survey published by the Ministry of Education in February 2023 shows that our graduates from the Class of 2021, who have recently completed their Bar exams and training contract, enjoyed an overall employment rate of 94.1%, drawing a mean gross salary of up to **\$6.429**. This is a testament to the quality of our graduates and shows that our education approach fits market demands.


